NO PLACE LIKE HOME

I would think that most of us consider ourselves very fortunate to live here in the Binsey parish at the northern end of the Lake District with the fells and lakes providing us with breath-taking views every day. I was recently asked by someone visiting here, whether I ever grew tired of the wonderful scenery or failed to be impressed with it, and I responded without hesitation that I haven't.

Of course, I am not a Cumbrian and I have only been living here for just under 4 years, but I don't think that I could ever take for granted the

privilege of living here. After all I first came to the Lake District on holiday in 1987 and as a family we holidayed here for many years, so I was very happy when the opportunity came to live and work here. Now, I can enjoy the views and the beauty of this place every day.

No doubt, a good number of you have lived here in West Cumbria the whole of your lives and therefore have known no other place as home. Perhaps, it is possible not to properly appreciate the wonder and beauty of our villages and all the surrounding countryside, if you have never lived anywhere else. However, I would hope that wasn't the case, especially when you compare other places with our villages and their settings.

We should feel very thankful to live here, even if there are some challenges in living in more rural and isolated places with a lack of shops, amenities and services, and either very limited public transport or none at all. The popularity of the Lake District means that there are always plenty of holidaymakers and visitors around, but our villages stay relatively quiet even in the busiest times of the holiday season.

In the midst of everything else in our lives that we find stressful and challenging at times, being able to go for a walk in the village and the immediate countryside, or simply enjoy our gardens and listen to the birds, can be a source of real contentment and relaxation.

Jesus took joy and contentment from spending time enjoying all the beauty of nature and the countryside, and by watching the activity of the birds and animals. He also observed that the birds do not sow or reap or store away food like we do, and yet they mainly stayed fed and well.

Therefore, he said that we should learn not to worry so much about our lives, and instead be reassured if that is how much God cares for the birds, then how much more he will care for all of us.

Book Review


Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus

"Lessons in Chemistry, by former copywriter Bonnie Garmus, is that rare beast; a polished, funny, thought-provoking story, wearing its research lightly but confidently, and with sentences so stylishly turned it's hard to believe it's a debut" The Guardian. Any book that comes with a recommendation like that, is one I certainly can't ignore!

The cover doesn't really speak to me of 'my kind of book' but my goodness how wrong I was. I loved this book from start to finish. I tried to eek out the end so it wouldn't be over, but I needn't have worried...the TV rights have already been sold to the highest bidder. I'm wondering how long I'll have to wait.

The novel opens in 1961, Elizabeth is a 30-year-old single mother and the reluctant, "permanently depressed" star of a cooking show for housewives called Supper at Six. By training she is a research chemist, though her academic career has foundered despite her obvious talent, and as the narrative jumps back 10 years we understand why. Female scientists are viewed with suspicion by their male colleagues; from her earliest undergraduate days,

Elizabeth has been subject to attacks on her reputation and her person, from the major – sexual assault and theft of her work – to the casual everyday misogyny meted out by people, including other women, who see her



independence and single-mindedness as a threat. Even when she finds her soul mate, Nobel-nominated chemist Calvin Evans, their happiness is a further spur to jealous rivals and doomed not to last. This novel explores the difficulties faced by women who tried to enter the traditional male arena of research science in the 1950s. The story of Elizabeth Zott is unbelievable and yet probably depressingly accurate, with its laugh out loud moments, its jaw dropping plot twists and the fabulous core of women at its heart, this novel had me hooked from the start. And the dog? What can I say? Genius!

How much do you know about key dates in History?

1 June. 1946Television licences were issued in Britain for the first time; they cost £2.

2 June. 1953On a cold and wet day in London, the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place in Westminster Abbey.

3 June. 1162Thomas Becket was consecrated as Archbishop of Canterbury.

4 June. 1039Gruffydd ap Llewellyn (pictured above), Welsh King of Gwynedd and Powys, defeated an English attack.

5 June. 755 English missionary Boniface, 'the Apostle of Germany', is murdered in Germany by unbelievers, along with 53 of his companions.

6 June. 1944 D-Day invasion of Normandy by 1 million Allied troops to liberate Western Europe from German occupation.

7 June. 1329 Scotland mourns the death of King Robert I. Better known as Robert de Bruce, he earned a place in Scottish history for his legendary victory over the English at Bannockburn in 1314.

8 June. 1042 Harthacnut, King of England and Denmark, died drunk; he was succeeded in England by his adopted heir, Edward the Confessor, and in Denmark by Magnus, King of Norway.

9 June. 1870 The nation's best loved author Charles Dickens died of a stroke at his home in Gad's Hill Place, Kent. His sudden death is being blamed upon his punishing work schedule, including tours of England and the USA. 10 June.1829 The Oxford team won the first-ever Oxford and Cambridge University Boat Race. Two eight-men crews raced each other along the River Thames in a contest of rowing power nicknamed simply "The Boat Race".

11 June. 1509 In a private ceremony at the Palace of Placentia, Greenwich, the 18 year old English King Henry VIII married his former sister-in-law Catherine of Aragon, his first wife.

12 June. 1667 The Dutch fleet under Admiral de Ruyter burned Sheerness, sailed up the River Medway, raided Chatham dockyard, and escaped with the royal barge, the Royal Charles.

13 June. 1944 The first V1 flying bomb, or "doodle bug" was dropped on London.

14 June. 1645 In the English Civil War, Oliver Cromwell defeated the Royalists at the Battle of Naseby, Northamptonshire.

15 June. 1215 King John and his barons met on the banks of the River Thames at Runnymede and sign the Magna Carta, thus removing total authority from the monarchy forever.

16 June. 1779 Spain declared war on Britain (after France had offered to assist in the recovery of Gibraltar and Florida), and the siege of Gibraltar began.

17 June. 1579 Francis Drake drops anchor off the southwest coast of America and proclaims England's sovereignty over New Albion (California).

18 June. 1815 British and Prussian forces led by the Duke of Wellington and Gebhard von Blücher defeated Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo, in Belgium.

19 June. 1917 In the midst of World War 1 the British royal family renounced German names (Saxe-Coburg-Gotha) and titles, and adopted the name of Windsor.

20 June. 1756 In India, over 140 British subjects were imprisoned in a cell measuring only 5.4m by 4.2m ('The Black Hole of Calcutta'); only 23 came out alive.

21 June. 1675 Construction work starts on Sir Christopher Wren's St. Paul's Cathedral in London.

22 June. 1814 The Marylebone Cricket Club and Hertfordshire play the first ever cricket match at England's Lord's Cricket Ground.

23 June. 1683 William Penn, the English Quaker, signed a treaty with chiefs of the Lenni Lenape Tribe in an attempt to ensure peace in his new American colony.
24 June. 1277 English King Edward I began his first

campaign against the Welsh following Llewelyn ap Gruffydd ap Llewelyn's refusal to pay him homage.
25 June. 1797 Admiral Horatio Nelson is wounded in the arm in a battle with the French and the limb is amputated. This follows the loss of his sight in his right eye some three years earlier.

26 June. 1483 Richard, Duke of Gloucester, began to rule England as Richard III, having deposed his nephew, Edward V. Edward and his brother, Richard, Duke of York, were imprisoned in the Tower of London and later murdered.

27 June. 1944 After 21 days of bloody fighting through the Normandy countryside, Allied forces took Cherbourg. 28 June. 1838 Since early morning crowds had gathered along the route through London that Queen Victoria would take for her coronation in Westminster Abbey. 29 June. 1613 London's Globe Theatre was destroyed by flames as a cannon is fired to announce the king's entrance in Shakespeare's Henry V.

30 June. 1894 Tower Bridge in London was officially opened by H.R.H. The Prince of Wales. After the ceremony the bascules were raised to allow a flotilla of ships and boats to sail down the Thames.

No Quarry Here Working Group

Residents from Plumbland, Parsonby, Threapland and Arkleby turned out in large numbers for a public meeting on Saturday 13th May in Plumbland Village Hall organised by Plumbland Parish Council Quarry Working Group. The meeting was in response to a recent consultation from Cumberland Council on a planning application from Thomas Armstrong Limited to resume limestone quarrying at High Close Quarry, Plumbland. The local MP, Mark Jenkinson, was present as was Councillor Jill Perry from Cumberland Council, Jill is fully supporting the residents' opposition to the planning application. Apologies were received from Baroness Hayman of Ullock, who was unable to make it on this occasion.

High Close Quarry was last worked in 1956 and was afforded dormant quarry status in 1996 under legislation introduced by Government at that time. Much has changed since 1956 and much more is now known about the risk to health from the inhalation of fine particulate matter that emanates from limestone quarrying. Young children are particularly affected at a time their lungs are still developing. The proposed quarry is very close to a number of residential properties which is a particular concern, however all surrounding villages will suffer as the fine particulate matter is carried in the wind. The role of Cumberland Council is to determine appropriate modern operating conditions for the quarry. A number of informative presentations were professionally delivered by the Working Group chaired by Tony Rutherford, Chair of Plumbland Parish Council. In addition to the risk from dust, issues regarding noise from quarry operations and the dangers posed from the proposed new quarry access situated directly on top of a high-pressure main gas pipeline were the subject of detailed discussions.

However, on a more positive note, attendees were encouraged from an overview on a recent legal challenge to the planning application from Plumbland Parish Council to Cumberland Council. It appears that the planning application fails to comply with legislative requirements that have been overlooked by council planning personnel. The outcome of the legal challenge is eagerly anticipated by residents who are continuing to submit their objections to Cumberland Council as part of the consultation process.

We might not be so keen on spiders and woodlouse, but they do a job – cleaning up a lot of the time – she doesn't want them to be forgotten. It is always lovely to spot something rare – and a python at a WI meeting is just that.

One of Lesley's roles is adder counting in undisclosed locations – and her other passion is bats....she had just rescued one and we had a brief look as she had also brought it in. 


