Whether we are keen gardeners or not, our gardens are there to use and enjoy, as they help to keep us in touch with nature itself and the wonder and beauty of creation and new life.


At Easter, many churches will have an Easter Garden as part of their floral displays, with the stone rolled away from an empty tomb because it was in a garden where the body of Jesus had been placed, and where Easter begins. It was here in the garden that the risen Lord Jesus first appeared to the grief-stricken Mary Magdalene, who was convinced that the body of Jesus had been removed from the tomb. For Mary the empty tomb plunges her into even deeper despair, and in her grief and confusion, she doesn't recognise Jesus and is convinced that he must be the gardener. So Mary asks if he has taken the body of Jesus away, and it is only when Jesus speaks and uses her name, that Mary recognises him.

Here in the garden is where Easter faith begins and Mary starts to realise that Jesus has been risen from the dead. As in our gardens we see the signs of new life emerging again, the Easter Garden shows how new life is brought to each of us through the love of Jesus, so that we can grow and flourish as God intends.

Monthly Letter

Firstly, a Happy Easter to you all. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is astonishingly good news; good news that can be trusted. What is very clear from the New Testament witnesses is that the resurrection is a profoundly God inspired event. God does not fit into the expectations of the disciples but goes far beyond anything they had anticipated, "the disciples stood there in disbelief, filled with joy and wonder joy (Luke 24:41); "when they saw him they worshipped him; but some doubted" (Math. 28:17). It is hard to grasp the enormity of this God orchestrated event.



The creator of the universe cannot be pinned down and examined in detail. As we have heard in our readings during this season of Lent, God is free, "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So, it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit" (John 3:8). Raising Jesus Christ from the dead chimes with a God who is free to surprise and amaze us.

The resurrection is God's invitation into joy. Some will have been through much suffering but have had, as a result their capacity for joy expanded and deepened. But whatever our experience, our background, disciplines and traditions, there is always that joy and faith within us, in the God of creation and resurrection. We are created for joy. The first letter of Peter sums this up powerfully,

"Blessed be the God and Father of the Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy we have been born in you to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead... without having seen him you love him; though you do not now see him you believe in him and rejoice with unutterable and exalted joy. As the outcome of your faith you obtain the salvation of your souls." (1 Peter 1:3, 8-9)

The presence and joy of Christ is ours. May we be open to God, people, and to the world and expand our capacity to experience the joy that God desires to share with us this Easter time.

Book Review

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig

Over the last few years I've heard so many people talk about this book, so obviously I had to read it. I certainly didn't regret it. It's one of those topics which occupies my mind often...what else could my life have been if I'd made different choices? I'm still thinking about it!

It really does make a good read; a real page turner.

So the story goes that between life and death there is a library, and within that library, the shelves go on forever. Every book provides a chance to try another life you could have lived. To see how things would be if you had made other choices . . . Would you have done anything different, if you had the chance to undo your regrets? It's a novel about all the choices that go into a life well lived.

Somewhere out beyond the edge of the universe there is a library that contains an infinite number of books, each one the story of another reality. One tells the story of your life as it is, along with another book for the other life you could have lived if you had made a different choice at any point in your life. While we all wonder how our lives might have been, what if you had the chance to go to the library and see for yourself? Would any of these other lives truly be better?



Nora Seed finds herself faced with this decision. Faced with the possibility of changing her life for a new one, following a different career, undoing old breakups, realizing her dreams of becoming a glaciologist; she must search within herself as she travels through the Midnight Library to decide what is truly fulfilling in life, and what makes it worth living in the first place.

I truly enjoyed reading this book. It's not one I would rave about the style or incredible artistry of the writing, but it is a cracking good story. I have to warn you that it does contain the issue of suicide, but it's dealt with in a careful and skilful way.

Give it a go and maybe reflect on the alternative choices you might have made...maybe there's still time to make them!

1 April. 1662 British King Charles II grants royal patronage to a group of scientists and academics founding the Royal Society of London.

2 April. 1801 Admiral Horatio Nelson, aboard HMS Elephant, defiantly ignores orders from his commander-inchief to withdraw his forces and proceeds to sink the pro French Danish fleet off its home port of Copenhagen.
3 April. 1721 Robert Walpole became the first Prime Minister of Britain.

4 April. 1964The Beatles fill the first five places in the US singles chart with "Please Please Me", "I Want to Hold Your Hand", "She Loves You", "Twist and Shout" and "Can't Buy Me Love".

5 April. 1649 Death of Englishman John Winthrop, first governor of the Massachusetts Bay Company.

6 April. 1199 Richard I (the Lion-Heart) of England dies from an infected wound while besieging Chalus Castle.

7 April. 1739 Travellers throughout England breathe a sigh of relief, safe in the knowledge that the most notorious of highwaymen Dick Turpin, was hanged today in York.

8 April. 1838 Brunel's new steamship Great Western left Bristol today on her maiden voyage across the Atlantic to Boston.

9 April. 1806 Birthday of English engineer and inventor Isambard Kingdom Brunel. Perhaps the greatest of the 19th-century engineers, he designed railways, bridges, tunnels, viaducts and ships.

10 April.1633 Bananas, never seen before in England, went on sale in a London shop.

11 April. 1689 The joint coronation of William III, Prince of Orange and champion of Protestantism, and his wife Mary II took place in London.

12 April. 1606 The Union Flag becomes the official flag of Britain.

13 April. 1919 British troops fired into a crowd of 10,000 Sikhs that had gathered to protest at the arrest of two Indian Congress Party leaders, 379 people were killed and 1,200 wounded in the Holy City of Amritsar, India.

14 April. 1983 The first cordless telephone went on sale in Britain.

15 April. 1755 English lexicographer Dr Samuel Johnson published his Dictionary; he had taken nine years to compile it.

16 April. 1746 Charles Edward Stuart (Bonnie Prince Charlie) was defeated at the Battle of Culloden Moor in Scotland by an English Army under the the command of William, Duke of Cumberland. Stuart fled the battlefield. 17 April. 1969 The age at which a person is eligible to vote in Britain was lowered from 21 to 18.

18 April. 1775 At the start of the War of American Independence, US patriot Paul Revere rode from Charleston to Lexington, warning people that British troops were advancing.

19 April. 1775 The first battle in the War of American Independence took place at Lexington, Massachusetts (Britain1 – Colonists 0).

20 April. 1912 The Irish-born writer Bram Stoker, author of Count Dracula, died at his London home. He was 65.

21 April. 1509 Henry VIII becomes King of England, following the death of his father Henry VII.

22 April. 1838 The first steamship to cross the Atlantic, the British ship Sirius, arrived at New York; it made the crossing in 18 days.

23 April. 1616 Death of William Shakespeare, playwright and poet, aged 52. He leaves behind a wife, Anne, two daughters, Judith and Susanna as well as a wealth of literary treasures.

ALSO Feast day of St George, Patron Saint of England. 24 April. 1858 At the second attempt, the biggest bell in the world, Big Ben, is finally ready for hanging in the clock tower of Westminster Palace, London.

25 April. 1915 In World War I, over 70,000 Australian, New Zealand and British troops met fierce resistance from Turkish forces as they landed at Gallipoli.

26 April. 1923 The Duke of York and Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, later King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, were married in Westminster Abbey, London.

27 April. 1828 The Zoological Society of London opened a zoological gardens in Regent's Park. Lady visitors were politely requested to refrain from poking the beasts through the bars of the cages.

28 April. 1770 English naval explorer James Cook arrived in Botany Bay, Australia, the first European to do so.

29 April. 1884 Oxford University agreed to admit female students to examinations. However, woman are not to be awarded degrees.

30 April.1945In his hideaway bunker in Berlin, Adolf Hitler shoots himself. His wife of 48 hours and former mistress, Eva Braun, took a cyanide capsule. In accordance with Hitler's instructions both bodies were then burnt.

Looking for a host of Golden Daffodils?

Dora's field, adjacent to St. Mary's Church, in the picturesque village of Rydal displays 'a host of golden daffodils' in the spring. The field was owned by William Wordsworth, who lived at Rydal Mount which stands further up the hillside. The sloping land was originally known as Rashfield, probably because it is damp and rushes grew there. The land was gifted to the National Trust by the poet's grandson Gordon Wordsworth in 1935. Limited free parking can be found on the road outside of the church leading to Rydal Mount.

And closer to home Cockermouth's Host of Daffodils 2023

To mark Cockermouth born Poet, William Wordsworth, the Cockermouth each year hosts a celebratory Daffodil Day of events.

This year from March 24th for a month **Cockermouth Rotary** are working to bring the community together with the shared aim of creating lots of daffodils using various materials which will be displayed to decorate the town and create "A Host of Golden Daffodils" to bring joy and positivity over the coming 2 months. Mounting will take place in the last week of March so they are in situ ahead of Wordsworth's Birthday on 7th April and will complement the real daffodils that are planted across Cockermouth and should be in full bloom.

I wandered lonely as a cloud, That floats on high o'er vales and hills, When all at once I saw a crowd, A host, of golden daffodils; Beside the lake, beneath the trees, Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

This class have been learning about growth and change related to humans, animals and plants. They also wanted to answer the question "Where does our food come from?" and have been thinking about the importance of making healthy choices.

WI

Bassenthwaite

Our visiting speaker, enthusiastic about his subject, enthralled members at our February meeting. Max Lothill regaled us with facts and stories about the Border Reivers and the turbulent border region between Scotland and England. The story of the Reiver dates from the 14th century and continued through into the late 17th century. In those days the Border displayed all the characteristics of a frontier, principally lacking law and order. It was divided into three areas called marshes: the East Marsh, the Middle Marsh and the West Marsh, and these areas straddled the present border. These areas had wardens who were often ineffective or aligned with family loyalty rather than upholding the law. The Reivers were the product of constant English-Scottish wars, often reducing the Border area to a wasteland plus an inheritance system that divided land equally between sons resulting in homesteads that were no longer able to support a family. Reiving, the raiding or plundering of livestock, became a principal business of Reiver families. They were also always quick to practise revenge raids. The word reiver is derived from an old English word revere "robber, destroyer, plunderer". Our word 'bereave' is also connected originally with the meaning to take away by violence. Reiver clan names must always be of interest to people whose families have their roots in the Border region, some shared by WI members or friends included Armstrong, Forster, Elliot, Cranston, Crozier, Dodd, Graham, Wilson.

The competition for an interesting stone was won by Irene Harrington with a stone unearthed by her Grandfather or Great Grandfather while ploughing.

The entertainment was a picture quiz using photos of objects from the 1950s and 60's. These were some common objects but photographed from an unusual angle. The winners were a team of our speaker Max, Kate, and led by Barbara who proved to be excellent at determining the correct objects.

For our April meeting we are joining with Thirlmere WI. The meeting starts at7pm at Thirlmere and the speaker is Keith Rigg on medical transplants: past, present and future. The competition is 'something heart shaped'.


