What do you want for Christmas?

It is a question that most of us are used to being asked at this time of year and often it can be quite difficult to answer, if you are anything like me.

But what is it that you want for Christmas? I mean, really want?

Our deepest Christmas hopes and wishes might be summarised in the following way:

Firstly, a desire for gifts and presents. Not because we desperately need (usually) the thing that is given, but because we crave signals of love and regard from those who give them to us. It is a fundamental human desire to be noticed, appreciated, and cherished. Of course, 'cherish' means to be valued and loved for who we are.

Secondly, we wish to be with those whom we love. Separation is hard at Christmas- especially separation through bereavement. We want the presence of our loved ones with us, not simply a symbolic gift from them.

Finally, there is a Christmas wish that goes beyond our personal needs.

There is deep hunger for peace. Yes, a peace that begins in our own homes, and we know that can sometimes be difficult at Christmas, and a peace that also reaches out into our villages and communities, and a peace that inhabits the whole world.

Whatever your own beliefs about God and your family traditions around Christmas, at the heart of Christmas is the message that God loves us and wants to bring us his peace.

On our own we are powerless to change the world around us for the better, but the Christmas story tells us that God has taken the initiative and that in the birth of his Son, God is with us.

God is with us to help us in the mundane and ordinary; the exciting and joyous; the darkness; the fear and the struggle. He is there with us in every aspect and complication of life.

On our own we can make no difference to the problems, difficulties & darkness of our world, but acting together with others in the love and power of God we can make a difference, a difference for good.

This is what Christmas is really about. To receive the most important gift of all, so that we are able to share the love, grace and peace of Jesus with everyone around us.


Book Review

Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll (School Years 5 to 8)

Since we've just had the month of remembrance, I thought it might be fitting to introduce some historical fiction aimed at younger readers. Reading historical fiction is a brilliant way for children to improve their social and historical awareness. Following characters on an emotional journey through a 'known' historical event brings it to life and develops an empathy for the people at the time in a way that merely learning facts can rarely do.

So buy this one and bring history to life...

It's 1941 and the Second World War rages on longer than anyone anticipated. Reeling from the death of their father and the disappearance of their sister Sukie, Olive and her brother are evacuated to the coast of Devon. After discovering a strangely coded message that she's certain has something to do with Sukie's disappearance, Olive embarks on a dangerous adventure as she's determined to get to the bottom of the mystery. Emma Carroll has a wonderful talent for bringing



historic events to life for today's young readers and with Letters from the Lighthouse continues to create an enthralling, thrilling read, whilst introducing situations and characters that are still relevant in our world today. Olive is a wonderful protagonist. Being an evacuee, she understands the prejudice that can come from lack of understanding. The thing that touched me most within this wonderful novel was the opportunity to hear the stories behind all those effected by war along with the refugees and the impact they had on the locals. War and hate have the ability to divide communities, but Letters from the Lighthouse shows how much can be achieved when people work together.

The love of family, the camaraderie, as well as the hatred and mistrust of the unknown and otherness of 'foreigners' is all too relevant today. Brilliant lessons for younger and older readers alike. A great adventure of a read.

How much do you know about key dates in History?

1st Dec. 1135 England's King Henry I died. He had fallen ill seven days earlier after eating too many lampreys. He was 66, and had ruled for 35 years.

2nd Dec.1697 Sir Christopher Wren's St Paul's Cathedral is opened in London.

3rd Dec. 1989 The Cold War ended after 52 years of superpower rivalry. Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and US President George Bush ended their shipboard summit meeting off Malta.

4th Dec. 1872 Crew from the British brigantine Die Gratia boarded a deserted ship drifting mid Atlantic. The

captain's table was set for a meal aboard the US ship Marie Celeste but the Captain, crew and passengers were all missing.

5th Dec. 1905 The roof of Charing Cross Railway Station in London collapsed, killing five people .

6th Dec. 1921 Ireland's 26 southern states were granted independence from Britain, becoming the Irish Free State. Ulster in the north remains part of the UK.

7th Dec. 1783 William Pitt became British Prime Minister and Chancellor of the Exchequer at the tender age of 24. 8th Dec. 1980 Forty-year-old ex-Beatle John Lennon was murdered in New York.

9th Dec. 1608 Birthday of John Milton, English poet whose works included Paradise Lost, Paradise Regained and Samson Agonistes.

10th Dec. 1901 The first Nobel Peace Prizes were awarded worth \$30,000 each. Nobel, a Swedish chemist, had died five years earlier leaving the fortune he had amassed from his invention dynamite, to the awarding foundation. 11th Dec.1936 Britain's King Edward VIII renounces the throne in a radio broadcast to the nation. After the broadcast he boards a ship to join the twice-divorced Mrs Wallis Simpson in France.

12th Dec. 1955 British engineer Christopher Cockerell patented a new kind of vehicle. Half-ship and half-aircraft, his "hovercraft" floats on an air cushion.

13th Dec. 1989 In South Africa, ANC leader Nelson Mandela meets President F. W. de Klerk for the first time. 14th Dec. 1895 Birthday of King George VI, who succeeded to the throne when his brother, Edward VIII, abdicated. 15th Dec. 1791 The Bill of Rights becomes part of the United States Constitution providing protection for the basic rights of the individual to free expression and justice. 16th Dec.1773 Unruly American colonists boarded three ships in Boston harbour and emptied 342 chests of tea into the sea.

17th Dec. 1778 Birthday of Sir Humphrey Davy, English inventor of the safety lamp for miners, who also discovered sodium, magnesium, calcium, barium and strontium

18th Dec. 1946 Clement Atlee's Labour government won the vote on state ownership which lead to the nationalizing of the railways, ports, mines, etc. 19th Dec. 1848 Emily Bronte, English author of Wuthering Heights, dies of tuberculosis at the tender age of 30. 20th Dec. 1803 The United States doubles in size when it acquires 88831,321 square miles of land from France for \$15 million – The Louisiana Purchase.

21st Dec. 1988 A Pan American jumbo jet bound for New York is blown out of the sky by a terrorist bomb and crashes onto the Scottish town of Lockerbie killing all 259 passengers and 11 people on the ground.

22th Dec. 1715 James Edward Stuart, son of James II, the deposed Catholic King of England, lands in north-east Scotland to lead a Jacobite rebellion.

23th Dec. 1922 The world's first regular entertainment radio broadcasts are transmitted by the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC).

24th Dec. 1508 London houses receive piped water again, for the first time in over a thousand years, since the Romans left town!

25th Dec. 440 Church leaders agree to fix the date of the birth of Christ. Previously some people had celebrated it in May, others in January.

26th Dec. 1943 In World War II, a Royal Navy convoy including the battleship Duke of York and cruiser Jamaica attack and sink the mighty German battle cruiser Scharnhorst.

27th Dec.1831 The Royal Navy vessel HMS Beagle sets sail from Devonport, the official naturalist onboard is recent BA graduate Charles Darwin.

28th Dec. 1918 The results of the first General Election in Britain in which women have been allowed to vote, confirmed David Lloyd George as Prime Minister. 29th Dec. 1170 Four of King Henry II's knights murdered the Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas a Becket, in Canterbury Cathedral.

30th Dec.1879 First performance of the Gilbert and Sullivan comic opera The Pirates of Penzance, at the Royal Bijou Theatre, Paignton, Devon.

31st Dec 1720 Birthday of Charles Edward Stuart, Scottish royal better know as Bonnie Prince Charlie or the Young Pretender, son of James, the Old Pretender.



How many Councillors do we need/are an appropriate number to serve the parishes of Embleton, Setmurthy and Wythop?

Background: Although Embleton and District Parish Council operates as a single council, it encompasses the parishes of Embleton, Setmurthy and Wythop and, historically, the total complement of councillors was set at thirteen. The designated number of councillors remains at 13 and it will not have escaped your notice thatwe seem to be permanently advertising vacancies, which can seriously impact on the working of the Council. Any issue requiring a vote needs to have 5 councillors present, to be quorate in other words. Sadly, the July 2022 meeting was not quorate and had to be cancelled, thus delaying decisions on important council business until September.

What happens next? With this in mind, Embleton and District Parish Council has sought the approval of Allerdale Borough Council to reduce the number of councillors, and the October meeting welcomed Lee Jardine and Kathryn Magnay from Allerdale Borough Council (ABC) who provided an overview and update of the necessary process, which is called the Community Governance Process. In brief, but these points are of enormous importance to all of us: ABC are proposing to write to all households to invite them to complete a simple questionnaire and provide feedback. The survey will be available online and in hard copy and once the consultation has been concluded, ABC will prepare a report that will be signed off by Cumberland Unitary Authority as part of the Structural Change Order. The changes, if approved, will take effect as of the May 2023 elections.

Bassenthwaite WI

The story of the unsolved murder of Joe the Quilter captivated her audience when we were pleased to welcome our speaker Sue Hinde and her fellow members of Thirlmere WI to our October meeting. Joseph Hedley, known as Joe the Quilter, was brutally murdered on the evening of 3rd January 1826. Joe lived in an isolated 2 roomed cottage in Warden near Hexham. Several visitors had called earlier that evening when Joe was still alive and just an hour later a local gentleman rode past and noted the cottage was dark and silent. Unfortunately, it wasn't until several days later that people alarmed at Joe's absence broke into the cottage and found Joe brutally murdered with 40 wounds to his face and neck. During his life he was known as a highly skilled craftsman, designing and quilting in both linen and cotton which demonstrated his skills through the extremely fine details evident in his work. Joe was about 76 when he died. Sue set the atmosphere for her talk with a dark room and just a little candlelight, illustrating the darkness of a small cottage in that period. Although Joe must have made an adequate living with his quilt making skills, even making quilts sent to America and Ireland, at this time he was receiving parish relief and would have had no money to steal. Despite 100 guineas reward all efforts to find a culprit came to nought. Due to the brutality of his death and subsequent reports in papers around the country a lot more is recorded about his life and living conditions than is usual for a person of his social standing in the Georgian era. Sue, a skilled quilter herself, told us of the intricacies of designing a whole cloth quilt, a quilt made of a single length of extra wide fabric, the sort of quiltJoe would have made and showed a photo of a quilt credited to Joe. The fine work achieved under what we would call very inadequate lighting was amazing. Sue also had a whole cloth quilt for us to see that had been made by the grandmother of a lady from Bassenthwaite. The design and stitching were very fine. Unfortunately, Keswick Museum doesn't have the correct conditions to display and preserve the fabric, but it is hoped it can be displayed at a larger museum such as Bowes or Beamish. The competition for a sewn article resulted in a table displaying some beautiful work. The winner for Bassenthwaite was Lena with a lovely, embroidered owl. A quiz of things associated with the dark was won by the Thirlmere team. At our December meeting we will have Ian France with A Christmas Music Extravaganza. The competition is a Christmas tree decoration and there will be a Secret Santa. The hostesses for the evening are Mesdames R. Downing, M. Green and S. Hill. The New Year meeting, January 12th, will be a talk about DeWoDe (Dedicated Women in Development) and the competition a recycled object. The hostesses for the evening will be Mesdames J. Hedley, H. Hunt and V. Trafford.

15 Jan. 1559 Elizabeth Iwas crowned Queen of England at the age of 25. Elizabeth is the daughter of Henry VIII's second wife, Anne Boleyn.

16 Jan. 1780 British forces under the command of Admiral Rodney defeat the Spanish at Cape St. Vincent and relieve Gibraltar.

17 Jan. 1912 Britain's polar explorers led by Captain Robert Falcon Scott reach the South Pole – only to find the Norwegian Roald Amundsen's expedition had beaten him by a month.

18 Jan. 1485 After 30 years of civil war the Royal Houses of Lancaster and York are united by the marriage of Henry VII to the eldest daughter of Edward IV.

19 Jan. 1915 German Zeppelin airships crossed the eastern coast of England to bombard towns in East Anglia, more than 20 people were killed.

20 Jan. 1265 England's first Parliament meets at December 2022

Westminster Hall in London. Representatives from towns and villages across the country meet for the first time in one chamber.

21 Jan. 1846 The first edition of the Daily News, edited by Charles Dickens is published in London.

22 Jan. 1879 Zulu warriors massacre British troops at Isandhlwana in Natal Province, South Africa.

1713 The signing of the Treaty of Utrecht 23 Jan. redraws the map of Europe. The treaty signals the end of the long and bloody War of Spanish Succession. As part of the agreement Gibraltar and Minorca become British. 24 Jan. 1965 The "last lion of British politics", Sir Winston Churchill died at the age of 90. His body is to lie in state in Westminster Hall, London.

1759 Birth of Robert "Rabbie" Burns, Scottish poet. Burns Suppers celebrated all over the world each year on this day.

26 Jan. 1885 The British commander of Khartoum, General Charles Gordon is killed by a dervish spear as his 1569 The first state lottery is held in England, forces are overrun by the Mahdi's Muslim army.

27 Jan. 1926 Inventor John Logie Baird demonstrates his new television machine to members of the Royal Institution in London. Some have suggested that this could cinema.

28 Jan. 1807 London becomes the first city in the world to be lit by gas lights.

29 Jan. 1596 The most famous English seaman and adventurer of the Elizabethan era, Sir Frances Drake, is buried at sea. The Spanish breathed a sigh of relief! 30 Jan. 1649 The courts deemed him a "tyrant, traitor, murderer and enemy of the people", for this England's King Charles I was beheaded in Whitehall.
