### **November Stories**

'Did you miss me?' –our granddaughter's first words to me when we got back from holiday, accompanied by a very big hug. We all want to be remembered and thought about. Remembering keeps us grounded in the stories that shape our lives, 'Do remember when your father....'

November is a month of remembering, from All Saints Day on 1<sup>st</sup> to St Andrew's day on 30<sup>th</sup>.



We remember those who have died on All Souls Day (2<sup>nd</sup>), a chance to think particularly about all whom we've loved and lost. We think about the Gunpowder Plot on 5<sup>th</sup>, and its part in shaping the political and religious life of our country. Bonfires and sausages are a great place to

remember what's happened in years past, like the time my uncle lit a jumping jack that chased my aunt shrieking down the garden path!

And of course, we remember all who have fought and died in war on Remembrance Day. Not only in the two World Wars but in those conflicts since that have claimed the lives of members of our armed forces in Korea, Northern Ireland, Bosnia, Iraq, Afghanistan. It seems that the litany of death goes on, which is why it is so important to remember. When we gather at our war memorials on 12<sup>th</sup> it's not to glorify war, but to honour those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for us, and to seek a new way of being that means that no more young men and women have to do the same.

At a time when the death toll from the war in Ukraine is still rising, we must work together for peace in a world where too many people still see armed conflict as the only way to get what they want. And remembering is a key part of that. As George Santayana said: 'Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it'.

Christians are good at telling stories so that past events become present realities. We meet to tell the stories of Jesus week by week and to learn from them about all that Jesus did, and does, for us. Because we know the ultimate reality that God is in charge, we live in a true hope that the way things are now is not the way they will always be. And part of that hope is that wars *will* cease, and that humankind *will* learn a better way of being than mutual destruction.

My granddaughter was supremely confident that we wouldn't have forgotten about her whilst we'd been away. And, of course, she was right. We must never forget those who have been important to us, even those who we haven't known personally. Our freedoms are at the cost of others' lives. We need to keep telling their stories.

I wish you a very happy November season of remembering.

# **Book Review**


### A Terrible Kindness by Jo Browning Wroe

This is a novel that I have been aware of for sometime; it has a very intriguing cover and title. I know they say you

shouldn't judge a book by it's cover, but honestly I think that's nonsense! That cover and title has been sweated over by experts. I'm definitely prepared to be swayed by that. And with this book I certainly was. Although the subject of this novel is far from happy, I really enjoyed reading it. Some of the characters I adored and others, I certainly didn't.

It is October 1966 and William Lavery is having the night of his life at his first black -tie do. He is content and proud sitting next to the girl he has long adored. Everything seems to be going his way at last. But, as the evening unfolds, news hits of a landslide at a coal mine. It has buried a school: Aberfan. This is, of course, the 1966 Aberfan tragedy which resulted in the deaths of 116 children and 28 adults. William valiantly decides he must act, even though he has barely any experience either in embalming or life itself, but he stands and volunteers to attend. It will be his first job as an embalmer, and it will be one he never forgets.

His work that night will force him to think about the little boy he was, and the losses he has worked so hard to forget. But compassion can have



surprising consequences, because - as William discovers - giving so much to others can sometimes help us heal ourselves. The long hours he spends giving his time,

his talent and his technical skill has far reaching impact he can't begin to imagine at the time. The course of his life is to be changed forever.

It's a debut novel and it's brilliantly written with some genuinely interesting characters. Some of the decisions made by the central character are dubious indeed and I wanted to shout at him to do things differently. Other characters make the most incredible personal sacrifices, which again made me search my heart in wondering if I would or even could do the same.

Although it is not exactly a joyful tale, it is a fantastic reading experience.

I found the book so compelling as it taught me about the lives of others that I've never imagined: the incomparable pain of losing a child, the life of a choral scholar in Cambridge and a trainee embalmer. It's incredible that all of these seemingly diverse things can be wrapped up in one story. It also taught me about some beautiful music that I have listened to over and over since: Cambridge choir's rendition of Miserere and Myfanwy, both of which are central to William's life as a child chorister. I do believe that reading should take us to places and teach us things about which we may never know. This is the point of reading for me. That's why I loved this book. I found myself totally absorbed in a world I knew nothing about and it taught me something, it really did.

# November birthdays

1 Nov. 1762 Spencer Perceval, British Prime Minister who was assassinated in the House of Commons in 1812 by a Liverpool merchant who blamed the government for his bankruptcy.

3 Nov. 1919 Sir Ludovic Kennedy Edinburgh-born TV broadcaster and writer, joined the BBC in the 1950's as librarian – editor – interviewer – newscaster, etc

4 Nov. 1650 William III, Dutch-born King of Great Britain and Ireland who just happened to be passing Torbay with an army of English and Dutch troops when Parliament declared the throne empty.

5 Nov. 1935 Lester Keith Piggott, widely considered to be the most brilliant jockey since World War II, he rode his first winner in 1948, and went on to win 30 Classics, including nine Derbies.

7 Nov. 1949 Su Pollard, comedy actress, best remembered for her role as Peggy the downtrodden cleaner in the 1970's 'Hi De Hi', TV series.

8 Nov. 1656 Edmond Halley (note the spelling!), English Astronomer Royal and mathematician who was the first to realise that comets do not appear randomly, best remembered for the comet named after him and not Bill.

9 Nov. 1841 Edward VII, King of Great Britain and Ireland, considered by his mother Queen Victoria to be "too frivolous" for politics. He was a keen sportsman and gambler.

10 Nov. 1697 William Hogarth, son of a London teacher. He studied painting under Sir James Thornhill, with whose daughter he eloped in 1729. His social commentaries of the day concerning 'men of the lowest rank', are recorded in his prints Gin Lane and Beer Street (1751).

11 Nov. 1947 Rodney Marsh, cricketer who made his debut as a wicket-keeper for Australia in 1970 and continued in that role for 14 years, making a record total of 355 dismissals; many, many, many of them English.

12 Nov.1940 Screaming Lord Sutch, 1960's pop singer, politician, leader of the Official Monster Raving Loony Party, died 16th June 1999 ... his eccentricity lives on through us all!

14 Nov. 1948 King Charles III

15 Nov. 1708 William Pitt the Elder, English Whig politician also known as the 'Great Commoner'. As Paymaster of the Forces 1746-55, he broke with tradition by refusing to enrich himself. Following his death in1778 the government voted £20,000 to pay off his debts.

17 Nov. 1887 Bernard Law Montgomery (of Alamein), British Field-Marshal of World War II whose many victories in battle included the defeat of Erwin Rommel's army in North Africa 1942. He was known as a 'soldiers general' and considered by some to be the best British Field Commander since the Duke of Wellington.

19 Nov. 1600Charles I, King of Great Britain and Ireland who, after upsetting the Puritans and Scots, alienated the rest of the nation with his taxes and finally declared war on his Parliament. He lost his head after the Civil War on 30th January 1649 in Whitehall, London.

20 Nov. 1908 Alistair (Alfred) Cooke, Salford-born journalist and broadcaster who moved to the USA and became a US citizen in 1941. He has written numerous books on the America's and has broadcast his weekly radio programme Letter from America since 1946.

21 Nov. 1787 Sir Samual Cunard. Canadian-born, he emigrated to Britain in 1838, and together with Glaswegian George Burns and Liverpudlian David McIver, founded the British and North American Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, later known as the Cunard Line.

22 Nov. 1819 George Eliot (Mary Ann Evans), prolific writer who captured the images and characters of her fellow native Midlanders in her novels which include classics such as Mill on the Floss, Silas Marner and perhaps her greatest work Middlemarch.

23 Nov. 1887 Boris Karloff, Dulwich-born actor who after moving to Hollywood made a career for himself on the silver screen starring mainly in horror films such as Frankenstein (1931) and The Body Snatcher (1945).

25 Nov. 1835 Andrew Carnegie. Born in Dunfermline, he emigrated to Pittsburgh in 1848, there he founded and grew the largest iron and steel works in the USA, retiring back to Scotland in 1901, a multimillionaire.

28 Nov. 1757 William Blake. Guided and encouraged by his visitations from the spiritual world, he engraved and painted many illustrated books, his finest works adorn the National Gallery and many of his poems have been put to music including Jerusalem.

29 Nov. 1898 C(live) S(taples) Lewis. Belfast-born he won a scholarship to Oxford where he headed a group of writers known as the 'Inklings', which included J R R Tolkien. He went on to be one of the most influential authors of children's books with The Chronicles of Narnia.

30 Nov. 1874 Sir Winston Spencer Churchill. Began his 'walk with destiny' as Prime Minister of the coalition government in World War II masterminding battle strategy and the diplomacy which ultimately drew the USA into the conflict. In a recent pole voted the 'Greatest Britain of all Time' – the result of which is difficult to argue against!



### Remember, remember the fifth of November... These facts will make sure your knowledge is up to scratch:

- The Gunpowder Plot of 1605 was meant to kill the Protestant King, James I. and replace him with a Catholic Queen.

- It was actually Warwickshire-born Robert Catesby who led the Gunpowder Plot, not Guy Fawkes. There were also 13 other people involved.

- The job Guy Fawkes had in the Gunpowder Plot was to guard the 36 barrels of gunpowder that had been placed in a basement underneath the House Of Lords.

- The alarm was raised after an anonymous letter was sent to Lord Monteagle, warning him to stay away from the House of Lords.

- Explosive expert Fawkes, who had been left in a cellar to set off the fuse, was subsequently caught when a group of guards discovered him at the last moment on the 5th November. He was then taken to the Tower of London. As he awaited his grisly punishment on the gallows, Fawkes leapt to his death to avoid the horrors of torture that awaited him. He died from a broken neck.

- King James I announced that the 5th November should be the day that people always celebrate that the Gunpowder Plot didn't happen.

The Uldale Sports Committee met at Mae's Tea Rooms and Gallery on Thursday 12 October by kind permission of Mark Nellist.

The agenda included the Christmas lights-on event . Also discussed was the recent refurbishment of the Play Park. The work cost over £4,000 and was funded by the USC 100 club and by very generous grants from the Cumbria Community Foundation (£1,500) and Aspatria and District Community Charity Association (£1,000). # **School News**

### Ireby

As we approach half term and settle well and truly into some typically windy and wet Autumnal weather, the pupils at Ireby School have been enjoying and embracing this term by exploring many new topics. If we look at just a few lessons here, you will, hopefully, gain a little insight into the variety of learning that has been taking place. Looking at the History curriculum, our pupils are learning to understand the skills and knowledge required to become historians and to be inspired to know more about the past. The Lower Key Stage 2 children, Year 3 and 4, visited the Keswick Museum where they had a fantastic interactive session. During this, they were given an idea about the chronology of history and all the children can tell you that the Stone age was over 3500 years ago. Children explored what life as a Neolithic person would have been like and they all had a go at grinding their own flour using a Quern Stone. The children had the privilege of being able to hold a stone axe head found in the Langdale pikes and they also became archaeologists and excavated a number of artefacts which helped them to work out the site was a bronze age site. They then headed to Castlerigg Stone Circle where the children learned about how the circle would have been used as a meeting place to exchange tools and knowledge. In Upper Key Stage 2, the children in Year 5 and 6 have been producing timelines in different ways to improve their chronological understanding. If you have a look on Twitter (@IrebyCESchool) you will see photos and clips of the children with their work. This really provides a wonderful window into what goes on in and out of the classroom and can also be seen on our school website – www.irebycofeschool.co.uk along with up to date information about our curriculum and events taking place throughout the school year.

Our Computing curriculum, in contrast, focuses on teaching our pupils vital skills and knowledge they will need to become citizens of the future, to become equipped with the skills and confidence required to use and enjoy a range of technologies. Mr John's lesson last week with pupils in year 5 and 6 was focusing on programming of Sonic Pi, working on loops to create soundtracks with layered rhythms using a variety of percussion instruments. As coders, the pupils were having to spend some time debugging, looking for syntax errors and logic errors, and they also played with sleep timings. If this all sounds a little confusing, please go to the school website and see the results! The PTA have been busy organising fun activities for the

children and their families this term. The Beetle Drive was back in the Globe Hall in October and last week the pupils enjoyed a film night in school complete with popcorn, drinks, snacks and of course dressing gowns, bean bags and cosy blankets. The children at Ireby really love these whole school events that involve all the year groups mixing together, and we are reminded of our Christian Value this half term of Friendship.

### Plumbland

We've had an excellent start to the new school year. Our Harvest Festival was presented brilliantly with our children completing their readings well and singing beautifully. We raised £100.00 for the charity MIND and a huge thank you to our families and members of our community who joined us.

Children in years 3,4,5 and 6 took part in the Cross Country competition at Silloth and despite the weather being wet and windy everyone competed with true sportsmanship, supporting one another.

Our visit from the STEM team at Vtech was exciting and our children took part enthusiastically in Science activities on the theme of Bridge building and Electricity. We have also purchased new Science Electricity kits for our children to use in lessons.

Year 5 and 6 children have been enjoying their forest school experience at Torpenhow and have been learning to whittle, a tricky skill. They have also learnt some new forest games and have explored their environment. One of their new games involves them taking part in quiet meditation and thinking about the stillness of the forest. Our Junior children enjoyed their visit to Tullie House to see the new Roman display and the figure heads that were discovered in the recent archaeological dig at Carlisle. As we study the Romans in our Year 3 and 4 History curriculum we really value the opportunity to find out about the history within our own locality. The children also enjoyed exploring the rest of the museum and our older children remembered the 'Drigsby the whale' display from their visit four years ago.

The Christian value we are focusing on this half term has been 'Trust' and children in year 6 are currently preparing worship time on this theme to present to the rest of school.

We are all excited about our new equipment in our adventure playground which is being installed by 'Creative play' and should be ready to use soon. We would like to say a big thank you to our Fops (Friends of Plumbland School) group who have helped to fund this project.



### Bassenthwaite

Our speaker for the September meeting was Aline Hopkins who entertained us with some spectacular photographs from a visit to Japan. Aline's talk was titled Japan at Cherry Blossom Time and as the title suggests we enjoyed some beautiful photographs of Japan's renowned cherry blossom. Her visit to Japan started in Tokyo, then up to the 'Japanese Alps', on to Kyoto and finally to Hiroshima. Along the way Aline captured pictures of Japanese traditional buildings, photographs that illustrated Japanese customs, traditional Japanese dress, Shinto shrines, monkeys bathing in hot springs in the Japanese Alps, the delicious food they were served as well as the famous cherry blossom. ### **Bothel and Kirkland**

At our September meeting we welcomed Haley Slack who works for a company called renewi, this deals with recycling waste so that the amount going into landfill is greatly reduced. She is the Education and Liaison Officer for the area. She talked about what can go into our household bin as well as food waste, small metal objects can go in like an old frying pan, broken pots, dried out paint and old textiles. Nothing too large, heavy or hazardous. Anything that can be recycled should go in the appropriate bins. Batteries of any kind should defiantly not be put in as they can ignite and should be placed in the bins found in supermarkets. These can also be provided for communities. Vapes are increasingly problematic as they contain batteries. Ideally they should be returned to where they were purchased from . After the bins are collected they are taken away and emptied at plant, they are put through a shredder a couple of times and dried. Workers have to be properly protected as it produces a lot of dust. Afterwards everything is sorted, metal ferrous and non ferrous, glass and stone. Some can be processed into green energy and soil improver. She was thanked fro a very informative talk, we all learned something.
